

**Using CRV3 Battery** 

### INSTALLING THE BATTERIES

Your camera is shipped with two AA-sized batteries. You may also use one CRV3 battery (sold separately).

NOTE You may damage your camera if the batteries are installed incorrectly.

### USING AN AC ADAPTER (OPTIONAL)

If you intend to leave the camera on for a long period of time, you may opt to use an AC adapter. Connect the AC adapter to your Digital Camera's AC Adapter Socket

Caution: Make sure the camera is turned off before connecting the AC adapter.

An AC adapter of DC3V +/- 10% (Voltage) and 1A (Current) MUST be used. Using adapters other than indicated may cause fires or electric shocks.

# ATTACHING THE STRAP AND LENS CAP

### Attaching the Strap

1. Pass the short, thin loop of the strap through the camera's strap hole.

2. Pass the other end of the strap throug

# Attaching the Lens Cap

1. Pull the lens cap cord through the camera's strap hole.

2. Pass the lens cap through the loop.

3. Tighten by pulling.

4. Fit the lens cap onto the lens.



### SECURE DIGITAL (SD) AND MULTI-MEDIA CARD (MMC)

The Secure Digital (SD) and Multi-Media Card (MMC) are external memory cards that can be plugged into your Digital Camera to extend the memory capacity. Please refer to ( $\rightarrow$  p.29) for the list of memory cards compatible with this digital camera. When an external card is installed, will be displayed on the Status LCD.

- NOTE It is recommended that all memory cards are formatted using the Format option (→ p.15) before using them with this digital camera. Memory cards formatted using other devices may be incompatible.
- When the SD card is installed, all images and movies taken are automatically stored on the card. Images and movies in the internal memory cannot be accessed until the card is removed.
- ⚠ The SD card will not insert fully into the slot if it is facing the wrong way. Be careful not to apply undue force to the card.

### Preparing the camera

### Holding the camera

1. Loop the strap over your wrist. 2. Hold the camera firmly.

3. Avoid blocking the lens and flash 4. Do not move nor

remain in motion while taking pictures. Use a tripod if necessary ( → p.27).



# **Taking Basic Pictures**

- 1. Frame your subject in the viewfinder. The frame in the middle of the viewfinder indicates the zone of automatic focusing. You can also view the subject on the OSD ( $\rightarrow$  p.8).
- Press the Shutter Release Button.
- 3. The image taken is displayed on the OSD for approximately a second (Auto
- Once the Auto Review has finished, you may proceed to take the next picture.
  - When memory is full, no more images can be stored. The camera will beep and the words "Internal Memory Full" will appear on the LCD if you press the Shutter Release Button.





# Selecting a Flash Mode


To toggle between Flash Modes, press the \$\frac{1}{2}\$ button on the camera and observe the Flash Koon on the Status LCD and OSD. The red Flash Lamp on the camera lights up when flash is enabled, signalling that the flash is ready for use. When a picture with flash is taken, the Flash Lamp will blink for a second to recharge. Once it stops blinking, you can resume taking pictures again.

### Inital Flash Settings

When you turn on your camera, the inital flash setting will vary depending on the level of your battery.

### Zooming

Your digital camera comes with a x2 zooming function. By default, the zooming is not enabled. In Camera, or Movie mode, increase zooming by pressing [h] ( $\rightarrow$  p.4). The Digital Zoom Icon on the OSD, @, indicates the current zoom level. To decrease the zooming, press [bb]  $(\to p.4)$ .

NOTE In movie mode, once the shutter button is pressed and recording starts, zooming cannot be further adjusted for the duration of the recording.

### Using the Self-Timer

The Self-Timer function counts down before the camera automatically takes a picture by itself. This is useful when you want to be in the picture, and there is no one else to press the Shutter Release Button.

- 1. Turn the Mode Dial to Camera Mode.
  2. Press & on the 4-Way Controller. The Self-Timer will engage.
  3. Press & hold the Shutter Release Button. Audible beeps can be heard, and the red Self-Timer Lamp will start blinking. The number displayed next to the OSD a Self-Timer icon will appear and start counting down.
- NOTE To hasten the countdown to 3 seconds, press the Shutter Release Button once again.

  4. Once the picture has been taken, the Self-Timer will be disabled.
- NOTE The Self-Timer cannot be used while the Continuous Shooting function (→ p.19) is enabled.

Playing Back Last Picture Taken

You can display the last still picture taken by pressing ②. When viewing the last image, you may choose to delete it by pressing 🗑 and confirm. Press ③ again to author to be beginn



### P. Counter (Picture Counter)

The Picture Counter can count the number of images already taken (count up) or available to be saved onto memory (count down).

### Language

Choose your menu language: English, French, German, Spanish, Italian, and Portuguese. The default language is English.




### Beep Tone

The camera will make "beeping" sounds during certain functions, such as the Set Timer function's countdown. This "beeping" sound can be turned on or off.



### Auto Off (Auto Power-Off)

You can set the camera to turn off automatically when no operation is performed. The period of time before shut-down can be adjusted.





### TV Out

If connecting the camera to a TV, you can set the camera's TV output system to either the PAL (Europe) or NTSC (North America)



### File No.

Your camera keeps an internal file counter for every image and movie taken that can be reset. The setting options are Continue and New.

NOTE All files are stored within a designated folder. The initial folder is always numbered at 100.

### Continue

Under this default option, the internal file counter is first set to "0001". Every subsequent picture is assigned an incremental File Number.

NOTE The internal file counter increments by 1 regardless of the media type, unless it is reset.

Under this option, the internal file counter to "0001" for new media only. But in case there are picture files already present inside the storage media, it will start counting from the highest file number of the media.

NOTE It is advisable to set the **File Number** setting to **New** only in the following cases:

Either the internal memory or SD card has been newly formatted.
 A completely new SD card has been installed.

### Format

This option will format all data in either the internal memory or the external card including all protected image files.

Caution: Do not eject the SD card while the card is being formatted, as this may damage the card.



### Reset

You can reset all the settings to factory default. Refer to the Setup Menu table to see the defaults for each setting ( $\rightarrow$  p.12).

NOTE The reset function can reset all the settings to factory default except for the current time and date.



### USB mode

This setting allows you to use your digital camera to

transfer images and movies recorded or as a webcam.

### Size (Image Size)

Image size represents the resolution of the image size represents the resolution of the picture. The resolution is, in turn, directly related to the number of pixels of the camera. As such, 2.0 Mega-pixel can be arranged as 1600 x 1200 pixels or lower.

NOTE The higher the resolution size of an image, the larger the memory space it occupies. Please refer to "Memory Capacity, Size and Quality" section for more details (→ p.29).

The DS8238 comes with a 2.0 Mega-pixel sensor with true 1600 x 1200 pixels output. When you choose 2048 on the menu, the software interpolation is enabled automatically. This enhances the image output to 3.0 Mega-pixel.

### Quality (Picture Quality)

The picture quality represents the compression rate of the images taken. For images with higher quality, the memory space it takes is also higher. Conversely, images with low quality take up less space.

NOTE The higher the resolution size of an image, the larger the memory space it occupies.

### Metering

Metering is a setting that determines your subject's correct exposure. The camera will compute the brightness levels, contrast, and amount of bright to dark parts in the scene automatically.

### ISO

The ISO setting affects the camera's sensitivity to light.

NOTE An image taken at higher ISO speeds may contain more "noise" or graininess than an image taken at lower speeds.

### Con.Shoot (Continuous Shooting)

With this setting, pictures can be taken continuously when you press the Shutter Release button. The icon will appear on-screen. A maximum of 2 continuous pictures can be taken, with brief 0.5-second pauses between each shot.

### EV (Exposure Compensation Setting)

Exposure compensation is required when there is an extreme difference in brightness between the background and the subject. Use this setting to manually brighten or darken an image.



### Audio Tag

You can record approximately 10 seconds of audio to go along with an image. This is called an Audio Tag. If the setting is enabled, his displayed on the Status LCD and OSD.

To record audio tags:

1) Within 3 seconds after a picture is taken, press **OK** to start the audio tag. The

icon will flash during the recording.

To stop recording, press any button. The recording will also automatically stop after 10 seconds.

### Sch. Shot (Scheduled Shot)

With Scheduled Shot, you can set the camera to automatically take pictures at intervals. To do this, several settings must first be adjusted:

Make sure that there is enough memory available for shots before using this function. Otherwise, memory may run

NOTE Once Scheduled Shot is enabled, the camera will automatically turn off. It will turn back on by itself when the automatic shot is due to be taken.




- 1) Interval
- Here, you can set the interval between each successive automatic shot. For example, you can choose to have the camera automatically take photos every 5 minutes, or even every 2 days.
- NOTE The number of shots taken using the Scheduled Shot is entirely dependent on the time Interval specified, as well as the chosen Start and End times. For example, if you chose the Start and End times to be 2 hours apart, and the interval is set a 15 minutes per shot, the camera will then take a total of 8 shots.

- You can choose the date and time at which the camera starts to take automatic photos. The Start time cannot be earlier than the current time.
- End
   Finally, you can choose the date and time at which the camera stop taking the automatic photos. The End time cannot be earlier than the current time.
- NOTE If the Start time specified is later than the End time, the camera will make warning beeps if you try to enable the function. You will have to adjust the settings again.
- To cancel the Scheduled Shot, switch the Mode Dial to any other modes. The OSD screen will display, "Schedule Shot in progress. Do you want to stop it?". Press **OK** to stop the function, or **MENU** to continue.

# BASIC FUNCTIONS

The Movie Mode enables you to take moving images. The length of the movie that can be taken depends on the amount of memory available within your camera's current memory storage.



### DPOF (Specifying Digital Print Order Format)

The DPOF option in the Playback Menu is used to specify the quantity of each image for printing from the SD Card. When used, the SD card can then be used in printers or taken to specialists in order to print the images.

Movies cannot be transferred to digital prints.



You can only specify the DPOF of the internal memory by transferring the images to a blank SD /MMC Card via a Secure Digital card / Multi-Media card reader (sold separately).

### CONNECTING TO EXTERNAL DEVICES

### USING A TRIPOD WITH THE CAMERA

You can secure your digital camera to a tripod to prevent camera shakes. To install, screw the tripod to the Tripod Hole ( $\rightarrow$  p.3).

### CONNECTING TO A TV

You can playback the images and movies you have recorded on your TV. Connect your digital camera to the TV via the video/audio cable included in the camera's gift box.

NOTE Be sure to adjust the TV Out setting (→ p.14) to correspond with your country's system (PAL or NTSC) before connecting the camera to the TV.

### Caution: Turn off the TV and digital camera before connecting the video/audio cable.

- 1. Plug the video/audio cable into the Video/Audio Socket of the camera (→ p.3). Connect the cable's yellow connector to the yellow AV input terminal of your TV. Likewise, connect the white connector to the TV's white terminal. Refer to
